#### Lesson in character traits






































### Fable Cards


This is something new and I hope it works out but I thought it would be fun to have fable cards. Students will cut out these cards, fold in half and lightly glue together. Then they will color the cards and answer the questions. If the cards are too little other comprehension sheets are also available to use that are full sized pages. Notice the questions that are asked on the back of the fable cards are questions that are aligned to the common core. Such as sequencing, understanding the moral or lesson, comparing and contrasting characters, describing character traits. Also the bigger pages include being able to ask and answer questions such as who, what, where, when, why and how to demonstrate understanding.

### Students will write their own fable.

In this writing activity students will put their knowledge of fables to work by writing their own fable. First have the students pick two animal characters out of a jar, or bag. Then the students will pick the moral for their fable. There are only 5 morals in this lesson pack, I think the morals can be a bit difficult for students so I have the morals of the stories that they read and are familiar with. They will pick one moral out of the bag or jar. Next the students will use their planning page to plan their story. Modeling the entire writing lesson



would be ideal. Then after the students have written a rough draft and it has been revised and edited they can use the final writing paper to write their fable. Please note the circles on the side are intended for the students to draw their characters inside. Another option would be to use the picture cards they drew out of the bag and glue them to the side.

(This is the label for the bag or jar to put the picture cards inside.)


