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
Before starting a letter writing unit, brainstorm reasons for writing to others. This will get students thinking about the purpose for their writing to make it authentic.

A great book to use for this lesson is The Jolly Postman by Allan Ahlberg.

Let students keep their brainstorming pages in their writing folders as a reference throughout the year.


Relate the parts of a friendly letter with the parts of students' bodies to help the parts and placements stick!

Heading (Head) – at the top
Greeting (Mouth) – says hello
Body (Body) – the meat of the letter
Closing (Rear) – it's the end ☺
Signature (feet) – at the bottom


The following writing template is great to use in the beginning when students are still learning the names and placements of these parts.




My favorite part of this unit is this interactive flipbook! It cements the parts and placements of the letter parts and becomes a valuable resource to students ALL year long!



### Parts of a Letter

Draw your head and label the <u>heading</u> at the top and the <u>areeting</u> at your mouth.

### The Parts of a Friendly Letter Flipbook



Draw your body with a heart. Label the <u>body</u> as the heart of the letter.

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Draw your legs and feet. Label the closing and signature as being at the foot of the letter.

#### **Teacher Notes:**

Copy pages 1 and 2 of this file back to back. Students should fold so that the "Parts of a Letter" heading is on the front. Students should cut on the bold lines on this front flap only so that a "flip" booklet is created. Students will draw themselves and label the parts of a friendly letter on these front flaps.

On the inside, students will expand on these letter parts as follows:

The **HEADING** includes your address and the date:

• In this section, students will write their address and various ways to write the date correctly.

The **GREETING** says hello and has a comma:

• In this section, students will write various ways to start a greeting.

The **BODY** tells important information with statements:

• In this section, students will brainstorm things to tell in a friendly letter.

The **BODY** asks questions:

• In this section, students will brainstorm question words to use when asking questions.

The **CLOSING** says goodbye:


• In this section, students will write various ways to close a letter.

The **SIGNATURE** signs your name:

• In this section, students will practice signing their first and last names.

This flipbook can be kept to use as a reference when writing letters in the future.

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Encourage your students to use a variety of closings to help their voice shine! A great book to reinforce this is <u>I Wanna Iguana</u> by Karen Kaufman.

The sign included will become a favorite reference for students!





### **Around the World Directions:**

Students sit at their desks or in a circle. One student is selected to be the challenger. This student stands by a classmate while the teacher displays/reads the card. The first of these two students to answer the question correctly gets to continue. (The other player sits back down.) The student who continues, moves to the next student to challenge him/her. Play continues in this same manner. The object is for one child to give correct answers until he/she returns to his/her original seat, making it a trip "Around the World".




This template is a one-page wonder! It's a letter writing template plus envelope all in one. This will save you so much paper and so many envelopes while still allowing your students to write and send letters on a daily basis!

The checklist included is perfect to have on hand for students to check over their letters before sending. It helps them hold themselves accountable independently!

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#### **Teacher Notes:**

Students write a letter on right-hand side. Fold along the solid black line, then along dotted lines. Student addresses envelope so mail is ready to send.



We always have those students who struggle with ideas for writing. I have included 37 writing prompt cards that are specific to friendly letters. Just laminate and have available to students during your writing block. They are also perfect for using in a writing center.

Your students should have LOTS of application during this unit. I have included one such activity to get them started! Students will write to the tooth fairy — a hot topic for young students. A great book to use with this is <u>Dear Tooth Fairy</u> by Alan Durant.

For most letter writing experiences, I like to have students choose their recipients and topics – refer back to that brainstorming page and then apply, apply, apply!

After reading <u>Dear Tooth Fairy</u> by Alan Durant, write your own letter to the tooth fairy. Be sure to ask questions that you've wondered about the tooth fairy in the past. Do you think you'd make a good tooth fairy assistant? If so, give her some good reasons why she should choose YOU to help her!

**Optional:** Cut out and display with magic tooth fairy wands made from straws, paper stars, ribbon, and glitter!

Have students pretend to be the tooth fairy (or her assistant) and write back to each other, answering their questions from the tooth fairy's perspective.
